

Agape Redeemed Church of All Nations

Beginning September 3, you are likely to see new faces in colorful East African attire in and around the Chapel on Sunday mornings as we welcome a new group of Christians to our building. The Agape Redeemed Church of All Nations (ARC) will be worshipping in the First Church Chapel at 11:30 a.m. each Sunday. As most of the church members are refugees from Africa, the service will be in both English and Swahili.

Many in this group have escaped war and destruction in their homeland and now live and are employed in Wichita. Their pastor, Rosemary Njoroge, is an immigrant from Kenya. She was in high school when she came to the United States and went on to receive both Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Wichita State University.

The congregation previously met at Grace Presbyterian Church and at Pastor Rosemary's apartment. However, most of the members of the church live in the downtown area and do not have transportation, especially on Sunday. They needed a place to worship our Lord and Savior!

We welcome our fellow Christians! They would love to share their joyful Swahili worship experience with anyone who would like to participate. It is also a hope that they would join at any of our weekly worship venues. If you see someone looking lost and trying to find the Chapel, directions written in Swahili, will be available at both Information desks (A-B and D entrances). There will also be signs and greeters to assist. If you meet someone in the halls, you can smile and say "JAMBO"—Swahili for "hello"!



From the Archives

A new display in the Archives Case by 208B is composed of the books used by those who took minutes of women's meetings since 1890. The print in the 1859 Repository is so fine that even a magnifying glass doesn't help enough to read it.

Items we hope you will note are:

- 1. Beautiful penmanship
- 2. Names of the groups were shortened to letters: WHMS, FHMS, WSCS
- 3. Most women lived in Riverside
- 4. The cost of their activities
- 5. The means of mending their books before scotch tape
- 6. Their meetings were held in their homes

Each meeting they would take a collection to cover their expenditures until "Ladies Aid" became "Women's Society of Christian Service" chose to divide into circles (smaller groups) and each member made an annual pledge to support a stated budget. This is still how United Methodist

Women supports their activities. The minutes reflect how the Deaconesses planned to start a preschool. They were also very supportive of women's activities.

Misspellings like "dinnners" in the minutes attested to the ordinariness of the note takers. Also, book reviews became very popular for



their programs and members took turns sharing. During the years represented in our display, most women were not working outside the home and supported these activities. With the change in our demographics, fewer women have participated, but our church is providing Saturday and evening activities to boost participation and continue the contributions women make to our church.


Third Grade Bibles

First Church College Student Spent Summer as Counselor at UMC Camp

David Hole, son of Denise and Ken Hole, served this summer as a camp counselor at Camp Comeca, a Great Plains United Methodist Camp near Cozad Nebraska, about five hours north of Wichita.

David's days consisted of accompanying groups of 5-8 second and third grade boys from one activity center to another, attending to their needs, helping center leaders, dining with the kids and supervising them in their cabins.

On a nearby lake, campers participated in canoeing and paddle boats. Though not a lifeguard, David helped supervise at the swimming pool. One of his favorite activities was the "milk crate climb" where campers were tethered to a tree and kept adding milk crates to a stack to climb higher! He also described "prairie surfing" where students rode a large piece of rubber tread pulled behind an ATV type vehicle. Of course, devotions and Bible lessons were also on the daily schedule.



When asked what he learned as a camp counselor, David replied, "Well, you gotta know how to treat them! But, I did learn that I enjoy working with the kids." David has returned to Cloud County Community College in Concordia, KS for his second year of study.

Then he plans to pursue a degree in English Education and Creative Writing at WSU. David hopes to return to Camp Comeca next summer. First Church is proud of our own church camp counselor!

Stove Builders of Guatemala Update

Stove Builders of Guatemala (SBG) which was started here at First Church, quickly grew as more and more individuals from other churches traveled with First Church to help build stoves for the rural Mayan people of Guatemala. These individuals carried the idea and enthusiasm back to their home churches. This created a natural partnership between First Church and other churches from Kansas, Texas, and Nebraska eager to participate in this ministry. Some of these churches now run their own teams helping to build stoves in villages they have adopted while other churches sponsor their members on First Church teams. As the program grew, it also became apparent that the program needed more exposure than we alone could provide. Therefore, we applied for and received "Advance" status within the United Methodist Church which meant Stove Builders of Guatemala would be promoted worldwide.

When Bonnie Laycock retired, it became clear to First Church and to the SBG Advisory Board that the new part-time Director of Missions was simply not going to have the necessary time needed to maintain the program at its current growth rate. The SBG Advisory Board had to make a decision. They voted to maintain the program and to seek another church to serve as the administrative body. First UMC in Richardson, Texas, a church that has been very involved with Stove Builders for several years, agreed to take on the duties of administrator, including coordinating teams, money and the overall project.



The churches that had partnered with First Church Wichita in the past will now partner with First UMC Richardson. We will still be a partner in this project and can send our own teams or sponsor individuals to go with a combined team made up of several churches. In addition, money for this project can still be donated through First Church Wichita, designated for Stove Builders of Guatemala. First Church will send the contributions to the Advance and First Church will get credit as second mile giving.

The SBG Advisory Board wants to take this opportunity to thank First Church Wichita for all they have done to support, grow, nurture and love this project. This Spirit-

led project has built over 1,000 stoves in the past six years and trained more than 16 stove builders in 8 different villages. Many Mayan families are now living much healthier; our stove builders have a new skill that pays well and helps lift-up their communities, and with all supplies being bought locally, all communities involved are benefiting economically from the program. Thank you to the many volunteers who took the time to go and help the people of Guatemala help themselves and to the hundreds and hundreds of people who couldn't go but gave generously of their finances so that are brothers and sisters in Guatemala could have a better life.




Final Senior Summer Sizzle!




