

Main, cannot afford the supplies requested. In families with several children, this becomes an overwhelming financial burden.

For 12 years, First Church has helped provide school supplies for Park School children. Especially needed are backpacks, EXPO markers, Kleenex type tissues, zip-lock bags of all sizes and disinfectant wipes. Financial donations made to the church and noted for School Partnerships will also allow us to purchase items as they are needed.

We are currently doing an inventory of uniforms on hand at Park. Thus, we are waiting to request any particular clothing at this time. We KNOW that winter coats will be needed later.



Stephen Ministers: A Ministry of Listening

Currently we have two people training in the Stephen Ministry program at Frist Church. They have completed about a third of the 50 hours of training necessary to be commissioned as a Stephen Minister. In recent classes, the art of listening has been read about, studied and practiced in class. Listening is one of the most powerful ministry tools anyone can use. It simply demonstrates caring. You too can become a more caring listener by understanding and applying these six concepts from the Stephen ministry training:

1. Listening is active- it takes energy and commitment to listen well. Look at the talker, pay attention and be aware of both their body language and yours.
2. Listening takes patience. Often trust needs to be built before the talker will open up. Constant patient listening is key.
3. Listening involves more than just words. Paying attention to not only what is said, but what is not said. A sigh, avoiding particular topics, repeating an idea or concept, even questions

asked are things that sometimes say more than words ever do.

4. Good listeners aren't completely silent. Restating key thoughts or ideas to clarify understanding helps keep the conversation focused and encourages the speaker to dig a little deeper.

5. Listening happens over time. Conversations build upon each other. Listening over several visits shows recurring themes and patterns and develops more trust.

6. Stephen Ministry listening is confidential. You can be certain that conversations under the umbrella of Stephen Ministry won't be shared in the UMW kitchen or with the ushers at the back of the Sanctuary.

Jesus was the model of a good listener. Much of his ministry was listening to people; people with questions, people with stories, people like Nicodemus and the woman at the well. As this ministry develops please keep it in your prayers and consider if you want to be a part of the next group to study good listening and sharing the love of God with those in a hurting world this uniquely Christian one-on-one caring ministry.

10 years of Camp Horizon!



Washington Summer Reading Program


