

First Church is the biggest I have ever served, and I am both extremely excited and a little nervous as time to really begin draws close. I love jokes and laughter – hit me up with your favorite sometime! I'd love to hear it!"

Reuter Organ – Opus 765

After World War II the organ building business was in full swing. Churches and schools were purchasing pipe organs

all over the United States. Right here in the heartland one of the largest organ building firms in the U.S. was hard at work. The Reuter Organ Company of Lawrence, Kansas is one of the top three organ building firms even to this day.

In 1948 Fairview Christian Church in Wichita, Kansas contracted the Reuter firm to build a two manual (keyboard) six rank (set of pipes) organ with Deagan class A chimes. Six ranks is a modest number of ranks, but very adequate for a small church. Each tone family of the organ is represented in the six ranks making it complete in dynamic range, range of pitch, and tonal scope. There are etherial strings, clear flutes, an oboe/bassoon, and a strong set of diapason pipes which are the backbone of the organ. The Deagan chimes of this vintage are very sought after as they are not produced the same way today. In 2013 Fairview Christian

In 2013 Fairview Christian Church decided to sell their building and relocate. Unsure of where they would move permanently, selling contents of the building, including the organ, became necessary. The day before Brett Valliant was to meet with the First Church Board of Trustees to discuss a chapel organ for the new Heritage service, he received a phone call from the pastor of Fairview Church asking if he had any interest in purchasing the organ. The timing was perfect, the price very reasonable, the instrument in good condition, perfect size for the chapel, and all of the pieces fell into place. The organ was purchased, dismantled, moved to the First Church Chapel, cleaned, installed, and voiced by September 14. The 1948 pipe organ is a perfect match for the 1950 Gothic chapel in size and sound.

Diane studied vocal and choral music at Wichita State University and brings a wealth of experience from her direction and involvement with Newton Community Children's Choir, Wichita Chamber Chorale, Bethel College Mennonite Church, her private voice studio, and her current teaching position at McPherson College. Under Diane's leadership the Chancel Choir will focus on the great choral tradition of the church in this exciting new worship service, Downtown Alive! United Methodist Deacons 101

After leading worship a few times here at First UMC some people have asked me about the stole that I wear and why is it different than what they are used to seeing pastors wear. The answer is: It is different because I am an ordained deacon of the United Methodist Church. When I give this answer, inevitably a puzzled look ensues and another question abounds. What do you mean...what is an ordained deacon? The ordained deacon in full connection is a "best kept secret"

in our church at large. Many people still believe the deacon is a stepping stone to being an elder (as it was in the past) or that a deacon is not really a clergy person (like in some other denominations).

The good news for you is

that you do not have to keep this secret any longer. In this and future articles each month I am going to answer the most frequently asked questions about being a deacon. You can become an expert on this subject by learning how our church is exploring creative ways of leadership both within and beyond the church.

Question 1: What is a deacon in the United Methodist Church?

'Those who respond to God's call to lead in service, word, compassion, and justice and equip others for this ministry through teaching, proclamation, and worship and who assist elders in the administration of the sacraments are ordained deacons" (Book of Discipline 2012 (BOD), ¶303.2). Deacons commit

themselves to a lifetime covenant with God and the church.

"Deacons fulfill servant ministry in the world and lead the Church in relating the gathered life of Christians to their ministries in the world, interrelating worship in the gathered community with service to God in the world" (BOD, ¶328). Simply stated, the deacon's distinctive ministry is to embody, articulate, and lead the whole people of God in its servant ministry.

I often tell people that my job as a deacon is help people connect what they do on Sunday with what they do Monday to Saturday. Likewise, we must connect what we do Monday to Saturday to what happens in church on Sunday. We are not Christians only on Sunday or only when we go to church. Following Jesus is a seven day a week commitment! Here is a third and final

definition. "Deacons are persons called by God, authorized by the Church, and ordained by a bishop to a lifetime ministry of Word, Service, Compassion, and Justice, to both the community and the congregation in a ministry that connects the two" (BOD, ¶329.1). In my case, I am an associate pastor with emphasis in congregational care and worship arts. That means that I provide leadership and service in ministries of caring and of worshipping. I use pastoral care and creative arts to equip people to serve and to make connections both in and out of the church.

Immunizations for All Ages

Flu (influenza)

The flu can be regularly addressed each year with an immunization. The subtle changes in different virus strains each year require getting an annual immunization. Two types of vaccines can be administered: a flu shot made with inactivated (killed) flu virus for healthy people older than 6 months; and a nasal spray that is a live, weakened flu vaccine intended for healthy people between ages 2-49.

Pneumonia

According to the CDC, pneumonia causes more

deaths globally than any other infectious disease. Currently there are 2 types of vaccines, PVC13, which protects against 13 common viral strains, is given to infants at months 2, 4, 6, and 12-15 who are susceptible to serious diseases. The second type, PPSV, protects against 23 strains and is recommended for all adults 65 and older, in addition to those with certain health conditions as asthma, diabetes, smokers, etc.

Chickenpox & Shingles

The effects of chickenpox can be prevented or lessened through immunizations. CDC recommends 2 doses for children, the first dose at 12-15 months and the second at 4-6 years of age. Shingles appears in people who have previously had chickenpox. The cause of shingles is a reactivation of the virus later in life. The CDC recommends the shingles vaccine for 60 and older. Doctors may recommend to younger adults who are at risk of contracting the virus.

Whooping cough (pertussis)

Highly contagious whooping cough is particularly dangerous for young children. The childhood vaccine, DTaP which also prevents diphtheria and tetanus, should be administered in 5 doses at 2, 4, 6, and 15-18 months of age, then 4-6 years. The Tdap vaccine is administered to ages 11 and older. This vaccine is especially important for any person that will be in close contact with infants

Vaccines for HPV (human papilloma virus), MMR (measles, mumps, rubella), meningitis, hepatitis A and B, and tetanus some are needed every 10 years. Follow your doctor's recommendation. Various travel vaccines should be considered at least a month in advance of traveling abroad (Visit cdc.gov/travel for a list).

We all know that pecans can be used to make delicious holiday dishes while an added health benefit is that pecans top the list of all tree nuts for antioxidants. A USDA study finds that pecans lead the pack for antioxidants and suggest that a serving of pecans a day may lower "bad" cholesterol levels, decrease blood pressure and fight against prostate and breast cancer. Pecans are a lean source of protein and high in fiber. One ounce of pecans provides 10 percent of the recommended daily value of fiber. Pecans are definitely nature's health food. Keep our student ministries in your prayers, they are the next generation of World Changers!

Dear First Methodist,



There is reading, listening, singing, praying, eating, and drinking. Ordinary actions made holy as people gather together in the name of Jesus with the presence of the Holy Spirit.

After hearing the story of how Jesus changes lives and transforms communities, the worshippers left the Chapel with an invitation to tell their own stories. The final hymn "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations" summarized the morning well as First UMC began to tell our story of Heritage Worship in downtown Wichita.

Each week greeters, hostesses, communion preparers, ushers, readers, and singers work to lead worship.
