



Qualified Charitable Distributions become more appealing

The Qualified Charitable Distribution is a tax-favored option for claiming charitable donations. But, the new Tax Cuts and Jobs Act has increased the potential deductibility of charitable donations for taxpayers who do not itemize their deductions.

The new tax legislation nearly doubles the standard deduction to \$12,000 per single taxpayer and \$24,000 per couple filing jointly. That means many taxpayers who have claimed itemized deductions in the past, including charitable contributions, will now claim the higher standard deduction instead. If you are one of those taxpayers, making donations as a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) can earn you a tax break on top of your standard deduction.

Following is information to help you navigate the QCD strategy:

What is a Qualified Charitable Distribution? The QCD is the direct transfer of up

to \$100,000 directly from your IRA to qualifying charities. Donations (IRA withdrawals) made under the QCD provisions are not included in your taxable income. If you are still itemizing your deductions, you can choose either the QCD or the itemization.

Logistically, this can be a check made payable to your charity by your IRA custodian and mailed to you to deliver. Or it can be a direct transfer from your IRA to the charity. (Make sure that your name, as the giver, will accompany the transfer.)

The important thing is that you never take ownership of the withdrawal.

Who can use a QCD?

You must wait until you pass age 70½ before you can make a qualified distribution and it must be from an IRA (vs a 401k plan). The Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) for an IRA owner starts at 70½, so the QCD treatment satisfies your RMD. But you can charitably distribute up to \$100,000 (per person), regardless of the amount of your RMD.

Getting the details right

Talk to your financial advisor and your tax preparer to determine the best way to use the QCD. Keep documentation of the charitable gifts you make with the QCD, including receipts from the charity. Make sure that your tax professional knows about your QCDs because the tax statements will continue to report distributions in the usual way.

Individuals and congregations who are seeking ways to assist immigrants and refugees are invited to attend "Welcoming the Stranger – individuals, churches and schools." This forum by the Immigrant Family Support Network will explore services to refugees and immigrants in our public schools, how one can "accompany" immigrants and stories from churches on support to refugees, the decision to become a sanctuary church. The forum will be held on **Saturday**, **June 30 from 9 a.m. – 12:15 p.m. at First Presbyterian Church**, **525 N. Della Lamb Community Services Receives Third Blessing from First Church Women

First Church sent its third all-women mission team of nine ladies to Della Lamb in Kansas City, MO in April. Della Lamb is a National Mission UM site, organized and supported by United Methodist Women and the general church, serving those in poverty. Della Lamb began in 1897 as a response to the influx of Italian immigrants coming to the US seeking a new start for their families. Methodist Women, concerned with inadequate housing, rolled up their sleeves and offered assistance and welcome to their new Italian neighbors.

Today DL continues its ministry to low income families. They operate affordable programs for the working poor that provide nutritious, safe, stimulating

environments so parents can be productively employed, or learning new job skills. Della Youth Services provides quality youth actives after school and Saturdays.

While our women served at DL they spent time playing with, rocking and reading to the infants and preschoolers, meeting the parents and serving alongside the teachers. They also assisted in the preparation of the family Christmas gifts that the DL community prepares. Toys, winter hats and mittens, new underwear, coats, books, and gifts for parents are collected all year. Our women paired mittens with hats, wrapped new children's books, and sorted good used clothing.

Eight First Church volunteers laughed together as they prepared food for this event.

Perfect Attendance is important at all schools, but especially in schools of poverty. First Church celebrated with 16 children who had perfect attendance at Park by attending all day, on time, every day the entire school year. School Ministries supplied juice, a sweet

Finally, 16 Park girls completed their Girls on the Run course by finishing the 5k race on May 13. Girls on the Run requires that the girls attend two weekly classes after school for 10 weeks in the fall and again in the spring. Topics of study focus on healthy lifestyle and self esteem. The final event is the run. School



Ministries helped underwrite the cost of the classes and new shoes for each child. The girls proudly wore Girls on the Run t-shirts with the church logo on the back.

Uniform pieces required are solid red, white, and navy blue tops, and khaki and navy pants, sweatpants, or shorts. The shirts can be any type, even t-shirts or sweatshirts as long as they are solid with no decoration. All sizes are always needed, but especially in short supply are pants and tops in children's 5, 6, 7, and 8. Gently used items need to be clean and it good repair, please.

Good used or new tennis type shoes

in children's sizes are always welcome. And, because of the AVID program which helps kids think ahead about higher learning, college themed shirts are allowed to be worn on Fridays. We have received and always welcome small or medium adult college shirts, but children's sizes are especially appreciated also. Items may be brought to the church and left for Libby. The receptionist will notify her that items have been donated.

In recent years DL has been engaged in refugee resettlement work, welcoming refugees from war torn areas. When a refugee family arrives in KC a welcome team is waiting to move them into a modest apartment with donated goods for housekeeping, English classes, suitable employment, guidance for children's schooling and daycare, citizenship prep work and enough money to sustain them for 2-3 months. The DL team and volunteer mentors stand by the family but the refugees have longed to be here for years in a safe place and have signed a contract to work hard and be self-reliant. Our mission education sessions were enlightening and opened our eyes to the suffering of others in the world.

Jesus said "Come to me all you who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest." Paul said, "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the laws of Christ." And

And in 1903 Emma Lazarus wrote for the pedestal of our Statue of Liberty, "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, the wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
