

This sermon series uses the image of a tree, from seed to sprout, to sapling, to fruit bearing and back to seedling for the next generation. This week may you feel God's strength comfort and love in an adversity you may face.

Study Guide

Monday, October 21, 2019 2 Timothy 2: 1-2

In the first part of this letter, Timothy is encouraged to remember those who planted the seeds of faith in him (his mother and grandmother) and those who nourished the faith in him (Paul with the laying on of hands.) Timothy is to guard this faith as a treasure. Paul has spoken of suffering and wants Timothy to know that being faithful is not always easy. Strength is given through faith in Christ. Paul points to himself as an example and witness and he wants Timothy to do the same. All things grow; seeds grow into seedlings or saplings and then begin to deepen their roots and grow stronger. In terms of faith, growing is not always done through ease. Our faith is deepened when we lean into our relationship with Christ. How have you experienced a deepening relationship with Christ in the midst of difficulty?

Tuesday, October 22, 2019 2 Timothy 2: 3-7

Paul uses three images: a soldier, a farmer and an athlete. These three different kinds of jobs all require discipline and faith. A farmer places faith in the seed, the field, in the weather and in God. A soldier places their faith in their commander, in the knowledge of their particular job and in God. An athlete places faith in their coach, teammates and in God. All must work through particular drills and skills to complete their tasks. There may be a great deal of suffering in the work, in the disciplines they practice and in the long days and nights as they perfect their skills. According to Paul, they will, we will, and Timothy will grow in understanding. There is a bigger picture that we cannot always see. Suffering encourages growth. In the twenty-first century suffering is avoided at all costs. Discipline is any sport or activity like music or dance is necessary to succeed and to master skills. There will be sore muscles, fatigue and frustration. Being faithful is the same. Those who went before suffered, often gave to the point of difficult because they believed that it mattered. *In what ways do you discipline yourself in terms of faith? How do you serve in ways that require you to stretch yourself mentally, spiritually and financially?*

Wednesday October 23, 2019 2 Timothy 2: 8-10

Paul says he is suffering so others can experience salvation in Christ. God's word cannot be imprisoned or stopped. Paul is willing to suffer, to be imprisoned so that others may grow and flourish in the faith. Suffering for Paul is not a hardship when it means others are learning and growing in the faith and the church is expanding as well. We sometimes use the word "growing pains" when our bodies are changing or when organizations are changing. Growth is not easy but essential as we consider the lifecycle of giving. As we look to the future, where might our growing pains be found? How might we choose to feel some discomfort in order to share the good news of Christ?

Thursday October 24, 2019 Luke 18: 1-5

A widow and a judge are the heart of this story. Widows, women period, did not receive much, if any, respect. Widows, if they had no family or male relations to help them, particularly felt the sting of being ignored. This widow was looking for justice from a judge who could care less. He only hears her case because he is tired of the bother. In today's terms, "nevertheless she persisted." The seeds of justice were planted in the widow and even when she met with stubbornness and a refusal to be heard, she did not stop. As people of faith, seeds are planted and nurtured. Life is not always easy, sometimes it is hard and an uphill battle, but if we cling to the faith, we will be strengthened to do what is right, just and good. How do you, like the widow, persevere when times are difficult?

Friday October 25, 2019 Luke 18: 6-8

Jesus, reflecting on this parable, says that God will provide justice. Now it is not hard to find examples where justice is not happening, where the unjust seem to win and those who are needy, afraid and seemingly powerless are overcome. Jesus challenges our faithfulness. How are we nurturing the seeds of faith and encouraging the growth of faith through our lives and actions? How do we work and act on that faith as good stewards of what we have been given? Today list one or two things you can do through the faith you have been given to work toward justice and the kingdom of God.
